When I left that summer I felt like I had nothing to leave behind nor to take, but myself and the memories that I shared with those around me.

It was a new year and summer and the time for Camp Pecometh had come up in my agenda for the summer again. It was 2013 and I was now fifteen years old already! I remember leaving and crying my eyes out for days after that. Honestly I had such a great time that I just had all these emotions and I guess I started crying. I am not ashamed because they were tears of joy. Maybe tears of fear, too. Because I had no idea what I was going to do with myself after being used to the flow of the

routine at camp. I got through it though, and now I am more than honored to share my experience with others. This summer I am coming back, sixteen and with a friend (and maybe a lot more tears). But I have no worries because I have experienced all that Camp Pecometh has to offer to me and others.

My best experience I have ever had while at Camp Pecometh was definitely this past summer during Late Night with Jesus at the

Galilean service. That week was the most powerful experience I had ever had during my 7(+) years of attending the camp. The Galilean service had more of an impact because, unlike everyone else in the camp, we had our service at around four in the morning, and it made the experience so much more powerful.

When you are at Galilean it is just so peaceful and tranquil. You have more of a connection to the service than you would during the day. Hearing the Chester crash against the shore and the crickets chirping, you just have this sense as if you are with God at that very moment. Then once you enter the hall and all of the candles are lit and you sit to hear Pastor Rich speak, you understand how special of a moment it is.

As a teenager myself, I never had the strongest relationship with God. It was always there but it wasn't prominent. At that moment while Rich was speaking I was just like, "I don't know what this is but I feel it's right." I truly did. I began to cry but they weren't tears of sadness they were just tears of thankfulness. I had realized what exactly God had brought me through and I just began to cry uncontrollably.

I later realized that in that moment it was the Holy Spirit that had come over me and I honestly couldn't describe at that time how I was feeling. Experiencing that service with people whom I had spent the entire week, and not only that but with people I had known for years through camp, made the experience that much more special. It being my last year as a camper, it opened my eyes to the fact that God truly is present whether you want to believe it or not. He will never leave you nor forsake you.

That night Rich had brought in current staff members who at one point were Late Nighters, as well. There were at least 7-10 staff members there that night, one of whom I had attended camp with the year before. I was sitting there with my best friend since childhood and two others who I now consider close friends that I had met 3 years before at camp. I realized that camp isn't just something fun to do it is an EXPERIENCE! My first year attending Late Night one of my campmates had coined the phrase "It's a late night thing." and I can tell you now it truly is just a late night thing. You don't understand the experience unless you have gone through it and I encourage any teen that is weak in their faith to attend because it truly changes your outlook on everything. I promise. Plus you get great food out of it.

Imagine time away from home, work, and obligations to: savor God's natural world, succumb to the restfulness of quiet; still the noise and busy-ness within; and seek connection with your body, mind, heart, and spirit!

My first silent retreat included all of the above! I arrived worn out! But, four days of retreat provided me time to "be still" long enough to feel reconnection with myself and with God!

The most unique aspect of a Silent Retreat is well, the silence! Attendees covenant to be silent and respect the space that all present have carved out for themselves. Lodging is in private rooms at the Riverview Retreat Center for one to six days - it is your choice.

Meals, served buffet-style in the Riverview Retreat Center refectory, are consumed in silence and set the rhythm for each day, as they are offered at regular intervals.

Daily mid-day devotions, which are optional to attend, are "spoken" by onsite Spiritual Directors. Communion is served. We were taught to "pass the peace" in silence with a nod and a smile for each one in attendance.

I enjoyed several two mile walks around the camp property on those brisk, but sunny, days and snapped photos of ice puddles, the Chester River shoreline, and buzzards on a cabin roof. The views all around the Pecometh campus are spectacular; so God-filled!!

Puzzles and collage materials were available which helped settle my mind. There was a room for reflection that included icons and a finger labyrinth. And, the sitting rooms in the lodges were graced with many books by spiritual writers.

I prayed much, read a little, and claimed precious time to type many poems I had handwritten over the past four and a half years. I recaptured a little bit of myself with each verse.

I also took advantage of both the on-site massage therapist available for a small cost and one hour of spiritual direction offered each day as part of the registration fee. This time helped me process the insights and reflections that came to me in the quiet.

While experienced in community, my silent retreat was powerful, prayerful, and peaceful! The silence provided the solitude I needed to rest, reflect and reconnect with my soul!

The best day, week, month, or summer doesn't describe an experience at Camp Pecometh. All of those descriptions are huge understatements. The words needed to describe my time at Pecometh haven't yet been uttered. But to put it as simple as possible Camp Pecometh is the closest place on Earth that you can get to God. I have had the chance to be at the camp for more years than most people and in more positions than most people. I have laughed, cried, sang, and danced there and I can't get enough. I was a camper for 9 years or so, I went to the Chrysalis retreat as a caterpillar, I then served on team for Chrysalis, and I will now be a counselor at camp for the second time. Each of these experiences is completely different and oddly enough the same.

Now let's travel back in time to the summer of 2003 when I first went to camp. I was 9 and had always gone to church with my parents and always believed in God. But camp does a weird thing to young children, or at least it did to me. I don't remember much from my first years at camp but I do remember that I actually started learning about God. I would ask questions, read my bible, and pray more often than I had ever done. I kept going to camp summer after summer and also grew closer to God every year. Camp meant seeing old friends and escaping the real world for an entire week to have fun and worship God.

If we fast forward a little to the weekend of my sixteenth birthday we see me getting ready to embark on my Chrysalis weekend. When we arrived at Pecometh I knew right where I was. I could feel God's presence hovering over everything. This weekend was life-changing for me. A bunch

of guys learning about and praising God and forming lifetime friendships. That was the weekend that I really gave my life to God right there at Pecometh. I was not the only one that gave my life to God that weekend and it was simply amazing. Being at Pecometh really made a difference in the experience.

At Pecometh I was isolated from the rest of the world. Alone with God. This was the same year that I ended my time at Pecometh as a camper. It was also my favorite summer as a camper because I was on the Late Night with Jesus program. The Late Night week was one of the most moving weeks I've ever had. It was there where I decided to become a counselor because I really got to see how they could affect someone in a week's time. I remember the last night sitting with three good friends at the Galilean sitting silent and looking at the stars fade into a sunrise. There was no question in anyone's mind that the presence of God was at Camp Pecometh.

Last spring I served on team for Chrysalis. This was a very humbling experience at Pecometh. I washed the hands and feet of others, I served meals, and I made sure the weekend went perfectly. On this weekend I also had my feet washed. If you've ever had your feet washed by someone else you know that it's harder to have them washed than to wash someone else's. After

be d During that weekend I also had an interview for a job as a camp counselor at Camp Pecometh. Little did I know that that interview would be the start of an unsurpassable summer at camp. Don't get me wrong all of my

other experiences at camp were amazing but being a counselor has been my favorite perspective of Pecometh. As a counselor I get to lead others in their faith. Not just my campers but also my peers. The campers look up to you so if you sing and dance they will sing and dance, too. Counselors also learn about themselves and their faith.

My biggest lesson this past summer was that God will not give me anything I can't handle. He tested my patience, my voice, and my love for everything on this earth. But in the end I had no trouble waiting for and caring for every different camper that I received. Also as a counselor I made friendships that will never be forgotten and never be broken. Thousands of miles and raging oceans can't end them because as a favorite camp song says, "Friends are friends forever if the Lord's the Lord of them."

Camp Pecometh has brought me closer and closer to God year after year. With every different position I've been in I've made friends at Pecometh. I'm counting down the days until summer because I get to be a counselor again at the best place on Earth. I'm counting down the days until another best summer.

For me, it started with Diane. I met her at my favorite place in the world, Camp Pecometh. Camp Pecometh was the camp where my parents met, the camp where I grew up, and the camp where I have worked for the past three summers. I guess you can say Camp is in my blood, or better yet my genes. It is a Christian camp decorated with world-class sunsets, delicious grilled cheese sandwiches with tomato soup, and some of my favorite people in the entire world. One week of Camp every summer is for adult campers with disabilities. That is

where I met Diane my first summer. She is a fifty-something, cute, petite woman who chooses not to speak, shakes her fist at you whenever she needs to be led to the bathroom, has been known to put her pants on backwards in the morning, and sometimes just reaches over to squeeze your hand and lets out a tiny shrill to remind you that she is there. My week with Diane was the most challenging, exhausting, and yet the most surprising, beautiful, inspiring week of Camp!

In the midst of the summer heat, I was asked to help middle-aged women get dressed every morning, to help them manage their meals and to deal with night-time accidents. It was hard to see the light at the end of the tunnel. But, it was Diane who really got me hooked. On Thursday at music time, the song leader sang, "This Little Light of Mine," and Diane, with the biggest smile on her face, just wagged her finger high in the air and sang:

> It was one of the most beautiful things I had ever seen. It was at that moment I dropped all notions or judgments or pities. I saw Diane was exactly perfect the way she was created. She was not a mistake or broken or a disorder; she was a beautiful person with purpose and such innocence and the biggest heart for loving others.

She wasn't the only one either. Betsy, with Down syndrome, always told you how beautiful you were and led us in a Zumba workout during every free time. And Jane told my joke (What happens when a frog parks illegally? It gets toad!) during the Talent Show. They all melted my heart in different ways. No matter how hard that week was for me, or how many times I helped a camper by cutting food for a lady who was three times my age, I learned so much from each and every one of them.

would allow me to work with and love patients like Diane and her family every day, to be constantly surprised by their character in adversity and some of life's hardest trials. I used to think that genetic counseling was too easy to be my desired path, that I needed to be more of a hardcore scientist caped with a lab coat and goggles curing cancer

during my lunch break. But as I was introduced to more lab science courses and spent way too many hours monitoring fish, I realized that I would not be happy spending every day of my life in a dark lab with glowing bacteria and dirty beakers.

Somewhere in the last three years, it finally hit me just how much I am impacted and influenced by people, by their love, smiles, strength, stories, and quirks. I realized I needed a path that would continue to surprise me, a path that will allow me to give the encouragement, support, and hope that have been given to me countless times. I also realized genetic counseling would probably consist of me giving families potentially devastating news every day, and there was nothing easy about that. To me genetic counseling is where science, God, family, love, strength, faith, beauty, and purpose all make one mess of an interweaved web. Genetic counseling is hard and can be messy but there is such good and happiness that grows. Just like my week with Diane.



Become a Friend of Pecometh


